Numeracy

Play Hidden itemsBegin by counting out a small number of items. (eg 5) Check to make sure the child knows the number of items. Cover the items with a cloth and let the child see you add 2 more items... how many are there now? 5,.....6,7. This develops a child to move from the concrete(things they can touch & count) into the abstract.

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Children often enjoy hiding games, especially if they involve gems, jewels or golden coins!

Adults could provide 'hide and reveal' games that prompt children to subitise or see the number of the group without counting.

The Activity

Put three bowls over one, two and three jewels. Quickly lift and replace one bowl and challenge children to say how many there are. Swap the bowls around rapidly for a minute. When you stop, can they point to the bowl with three? Lift the bowl and see if children can instantly say whether they are right.

How can you put ice cream in a hot oven without it melting? Cover it with meringue! A Baked Alaska looks and tastes amazing. The secret is to cook it for just long enough to bake the meringue but not enough to melt the ice cream. The ice cream stays frozen because meringue and sponge cake are full of air bubbles and so don't conduct heat very well. They insulate the ice cream from the heat of the oven!



Preheat the oven to 200 °C.

Slice the cake so you have five Icm thick slices and place each on a baking sheet. Spread a thin layer of jam on top of each slice.

To make the meringue whisk the egg whites until they form stiff peaks, slowly add half the sugar and cream of tartar and whisk again. Add the rest of the sugar and whisk again until the meringue looks thick and glossy.

Place a scoop of ice cream on top of each sponge cake slice and cover with meringue mixture. Bake for 3-4 minutes and serve immediately!
